



Bowie, MD. January **12, 2014.** In recent years, Project ENRICH has shifted its focus to include more information about how students can connect with "the real world" as part of the process of the years-long transition from high school to productive lives as adults. Whether it was about finding money for college or choosing a career, Director Willie Hines has sought to lead students and their families to more useful information that can help participants make the most intelligent choices about their future. In December, for example, was about college costs as Project ENRICH sponsored a college financial aid workshop. On January12, it was about career as several guest speakers brought exciting messages about post-collegiate options working for Uncle Sam during the Project ENRICH Showcase.

About 60 students and parents gathered at the Thurgood Marshall Library at Bowie State University for the Career Showcase program. They heard about the road to rewarding and exciting diplomatic careers working for the U.S. Department of State; serving around the world as a naval officer through education at the U.S. Naval Academy in nearby Annapolis and further opportunities through service to the U.S. National Guard.

One of the messages of the workshop was not everyone is cut out for careers in Corporate America or in the traditional professions: law and medicine. The January 12 presentations exposed youth to often-undersold career choices in the U.S. government. The federal sector is sometimes mistakenly viewed as "mundane" and "unexciting." But the information that came out of Career Day showed student that a career with Uncle

U.S. Ambassador Teddy B. Taylor, a member of Gamma Pi chapter, stirred students with his recount of a stellar career spent living in foreign countries, learning multiple languages, negotiating difficult international issues and working for the President and U.S. Secretary of State as a diplomat. A little more than a year removed from three years of service as U.S. Ambassador to the South Pacific nations of Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and Vanuatu, he challenged Project ENRICH students to take a world view of career options. "I can promise you this, you will not regret it," Brother Ambassador Taylor said, encouraging students to consider the State Department and work as globetrotting diplomats. "When somebody exposes you to a career opportunity, take it. You never know what might happen."

The Naval Academy contingent at the Career Showcase included several uniformed Midshipmen who each related their own experience and path to the Naval Academy. They talked about the free education, the service commitment to follow as well as he process for applying as well as getting recommendations. One of the Navy presenters was Keenan Reynolds, the school's current superstar NCAA-record-setting quarterback.

The "Y" was and is, a social center and meeting place for African-Americanorganizations, including Mu Omega Chapter, which held meetings there before purchasing itsfirst fraternity house in the 1950s.

Among the "Y's" luminary alumni...Brother Dr. Frank "Tick" Coleman (Beta '32, OmegaChapter), who was the unquestionable "heart and soul" of the Christian Street "Y", and the late, great, Wilton "Wilt The Stilt" Chamberlain, who, as a student at Overbrook High School in West Philadelphia, led the Christian Street "Y" basketball team to the national

YMCA championship, the first African-American "Y" team to attain this honor. Mu Omega - Stephen R. Cox Presented Three National Engineering Awards



Cox, PI (Principal Investigator) and Project Director of the Greater Philadelphia Region, Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation, at Drexel University in Philadelphia, received the 2013 BEYA (Black Engineer of the Year) Award in Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM). Brother Cox was recipient of the Provost's Award for graduating the largest number of Minority undergraduate

and graduate scientists and engineers in the tri-state area of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware. Nine (9) area universities comprise the local Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (LSAMP), which students are principally African-American, Hispanic and Native American. LSAMP is funded by the National Science Foundation (NSA). Brother Cox was also nominated by his academic peers at Drexel for the College-Level Promotion of Education Award, presented to him this past February, in Washington, D.C. If this shower of accolades didn't widen Brother Cox's mile, his trek to Nashville, TN, to receive the Golden Torch Award from the National Society of Black Engineers Conference truly did.

Brother Stephen Cox earned a B.S. in Biophysics, and an M.S. in Biomedical Engineering from Drexel University He was initiated at Mu Omega Chapter, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Inc., Spring, 1999. Since his organizing of the LSAMP Program at Drexel in 1994, some 12,000 students have earned degrees...350 earning the Ph.D.! Brother Cox sought his first cadre of students from the urban centers of America, commenting, "students had to know that fields of study such as biomedical engineering and nanomanufacturing existed, and then introduce them as freshmen, to scientific research". Brother Cox mused, "my success is measured by the sight of my students walking across that stage, graduating, and getting that degree"! Brother Stephen R. Nu Omicron Basileus Receives Million Dollar Grant



Brother Dr. James Bethea, CRC, LMHC

Queens, NY. March 2014. Bro. Dr. James Bethea, CRC, LMHC, Basileus of Nu Omicron Chapter, Queens, NY, was recently awarded (on behalf of St. John's University) a \$960,000 PEAK grant (\$480,000 per year for 2 years) with the option of 2 one-year renewals for a potential total of \$1,920,000.

PEAK (Pathways to Excellence, Achievement, and Knowledge) is part of former New York City Mayor, Michael Bloomberg's Young Men's Initiative (YMI). YMI consists of a comprehensive effort to help Black and Latino young men achieve their professional, educational, and personal goals. PEAK combines elements of educational enrichment, behavior modification, and therapeutic services, and is provided in conjunction with on-going probation supervision provided by The New York City Department of Probation (DOP). PEAK engages youth who are in grades 8 through 12 and are between the ages of 14 and 18, year round, during school hours as well as after-school.

The aim of PEAK is to increase positive outcomes for adolescents who are on and in jeopardy of being placed due to a probation revocation as well as youth whose risk and offense severity levels at adjudication suggest they need rigorous programming in order to thrive in the community without the need for residential placement. PEAK combines educational enrichment, behavior modification and therapeutic services, and probation supervision. Utilizing an intervention strategy that provides extended-day, integrated educational and treatment services, the program seeks to provide participants with the structure and guidance needed for success by creating experiential learning opportunities with appropriate behavior modification and treatment services integrated into the program.

Ultimately, students will improve education and behavioral outcomes as well as self-efficacy. The grant is sponsored by the New York City Department of Probation in collaboration with the Center for Economic Opportunity (CEO), and the Department of Education (DOE). Bro. Bethea is an Associate Professor of Counselor Education and Coordinator of the Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program within the Human Services and Counseling Department at St. John's University. He's also the Director of the PEAK program. Bro. Bethea holds a Ph.D. in Rehabilitation Counselor Education from The University of Iowa, a M.S. in Rehabilitation Counseling from Boston University, and a B.S. in Recreation and Leisure Studies from Mount Olive College. He is the first African American male professor to be granted tenure in the 103 year history of the College of Education at St. John's University.

Nu Omicron Host Project EMBODI for Deltas

Queens, New York. December 11, 2013. Nu Omicron Chapter served as the main facilitators and mentors for the EMBODI "Meet & Greet" for the Queens Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated. EMBODI, which stands for "Empowering Males to Build Opportunities for Developing Independence," is one of Delta Sigma Theta's international programs. The purpose of the program is to address the social, educational, and emotional issues affecting African-American males. The young men who are participated in the EMBODI program have been iden-

tified as "at-risk" and are participants in the New York City Beacon program which is housed in the Catherine and Count Basie Middle School. Over twenty young men, ranging from 15-17 years of age were in attendance at the Omega Psi Phi, Nu Omicron Chapter, Early Childhood Center. Discussion during the kick off "Meet and Greet" included topics such as "Cultural Acceptance" and "Use of the N-word". The two hour session was a huge success and similar events are scheduled for the upcoming months culminating in a community day which will occur in May 2014.



The 28th Hour Forum






Iota Epsilon Autism Awareness



Oscar James Cooper, William Griffin Brannon, and John McMorries were dispatched to Lincoln University with the charge of establishing the second chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Upon their arrival they were met with the same type of resistance they encountered when attempting to establish the Fraternity. Bros. Cooper, Brannon, and McMorries would leave Lincoln University thinking that they were unsuccessful in their attempt for expansion of Omega. As they began to return to the train station they encountered a lady by the name of Charlotte Wilson. She inquired as to why they appeared to be discouraged. They explained to her the intent of their visit to Lincoln University and she felt as though she

could assist them with their goal. She informed them that they could use her home to expand their Fraternity. Thus, the night of February 6, 1914, twenty Lincoln men were initiated into the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. thus establishing Beta Chapter, Omega's first mark of expansion.

One hundred years have passed since this milestone event. To commemorate the founding of Beta Chapter a four day celebration was planned. The initial part of the celebration began similar to the chapter's founding. The brothers of Beta Chapter, friends, and guest would pay tribute to Sister Wilson's contributions to Beta Chapter with a memorial services honoring her memory. The service was conducted by Bro. Bernard Oates (17-Beta-60). Bro. Oates reflected on the life of Sister Wilson and his interactions with her. He mentioned how she would meet with the basilei of Beta Chapter and host dinners for the chapter. She would also provide guidance to the brothers in reference to their personal lives. Many brothers would bring the young lady they were dating to meet Sister Wilson. After the meeting she would let the brother know whether the young lady was a good fit for the brother. Brothers who had the opportunity to know Sis-

ter Wilson shared stories about her unwavering support for Beta Chapter until her death. At the conclusion of the ceremony, brothers gathered and sang, "Ring Those Bells" and "Omega Dear."

The brothers of Beta Chapter would leave Union Memorial Cemetery and gather on the campus of Lincoln University for their Charter Day Reception/Re-Dedication ceremony. This program would begin with a reception allowing for fellowship and registration. Brothers spanning seven decades of Beta Chapter, fellowshipped with one another, reminiscing about their activities and antics as Beta brothers on Lincoln's campus. During this reception Beta Chapter brothers and guests were pleased to have in attendance the 39th Grand Basileus Bro. Dr. Andrew Ray, Grand Keeper of Finance Bro. W. Kelly Shannon, Grand Counselor Christopher Cooper, Grand Chaplain Bro. Christopher T. Curry, Executive Director Kenneth Barnes, 28th Second District Representative/Special Assistant to the Grand Basileus Bro. Benjamin Jeffers, 31st Second District Representative/Chief of Staff to the Grand Basileus Bro. James "Scrappy" Jordan, and 1st Vice District Representative Bro. Milton

-bert (Basileus of Beta Chapter) and Jamal Parker (Beta Chapter Centennial Chairman). Bros. Antoine McDonald and Christopher Howard provided an overview of Beta Chapter's establishment while Bro. Jeffrey Byard, II introduced the keynote speaker for the occasion Bro. Calvin Morris (16-Beta-60). Bro. Morris delivered a message on the character of the men Beta has produced and how these characteristics and principles in these men have been utilized to create productive and successful men in our communities. Bro. Morris concluded his message and received a standing ovation. The undergraduate brothers of Beta Chapter proceeded to honor those individuals who had made contributions to the chapter during the academic year. Dr. Lenetta Lee, Lincoln University's Interim Dean of Students &



Director of Residence Life was honored as the 2014 Beta Chapter Sister Charlotte "Lottie B." Wilson Award recipient for her work and contributions to the undergraduates. Bro. Anjuan R. Collins, Beta Chapter Advisor was honored with the Basileus Award and Bro. Federico Ghelli received the 2014 Beta Chapter Omega Man of the Year Award. As the awards presentation concluded, the brothers prepared themselves for the Re-Dedication Ceremony. Grand Basileus Dr. Andrew Ray delivered a message to the brotherhood reminding us of the importance of our duties and responsibilities to Omega that we were entrusted with upon entering the fold. As the ceremony concluded, the brothers of Beta Chapter assembled to march to the quad. Led by Bro. Evan Herbert a procession of 20 brothers (11 undergraduates and 9 alumni Beta brothers) symbolizing the 20 charter members initiated into Beta Chapter on that same night 100 years ago, led the chapter to the quad. Once the brothers arrived at the quad, Bro. Damaas Stephens in his customary form led the brothers in celebration and song as the campus of Lincoln University was treated to 100 years of Beta Chapter.

.The second day of Beta Chapter's Centennial Celebration focused on facilitating ideas and creating leaders for the next 100 years. Bro. Charles Farrell (4-Beta-70) developed a forum consisting of brothers

from 1940-2013 to discuss ways in which the chapter can better serve the Fraternity and Lincoln University. At the conclusion of this forum the chapter proceeded to participate in a community service program in conjunction with the Philadelphia YMCA. Bro. Bertram Lawson, II (1-Beta-96) invited the brotherhood to assist young adults of Philadelphia with their after school activities. The undergraduate brothers as well as the alumni brothers of Beta chapter served as tutors in the areas of science, mathematics, English, and several other disciplines. At the conclusion of the tutoring the undergraduates spoke about the importance of pursuing a college education.

The third day of the celebration was dedicated to the celebration's signature event "The Beta Chapter Centennial Gala." This event took place at the Pennsylvania Convention Center and played host to seven decades of Beta Chapter brothers as well as distinguished Omega Men throughout the world. In attendance, Grand Basileus Dr. Andrew Ray (along with members of the Grand Council), 2nd District Representative (along with members of the Second District Council), Chairwoman of Lincoln University Board of trustees Soror Kimberly Lloyd, Lincoln University National Alumni As-

-ssociation President Robert Ingram, along with friends and family of Beta Chapter. Bros. Carlton Usher and Kwame Dow served as the masters of ceremonies for the occasion. Brothers and guest heard accounts of Beta Chapter's rich history and contributions to Lincoln University. Upon completion of this historical recap, Bro. Usher had the honor of

introducing the keynote speaker of the night Bro. James "Scrappy" Jordan. Bro. Jordan provided remarks that illustrated the necessity of friendship, fraternity, and family. He shared his story about the factors that led to the creation of his own business and how he factored his family in every decision. He provided everyone with insight on the trials and tribulations associated with this venture and how his fraternal experiences prepared him to meet these challenges. Finally, he shared how the friendship of Omega can provide solace to a brother in any situation. Upon completion of his remarks, all stood and gave a resounding standing ovation to one of Beta Chapter's most accomplished sons. The program would continue and the chapter would honor its' Centennial honorees. Bro. James Jordan received the Oscar J. Cooper Award for his dedication to the Fraternity on an International, District, and local level.



On July 30, 2011 he was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia and on March 4, 2012, his spirit left this world. Bryan left a wife, three young daughters, and a host of family and friends who loved him and who all agree that he was gone too soon.

Gone too soon are three words that Maurice Cottom, of Tau Lambda Lambda Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity., says helps to empower him to support bone marrow donation awareness. Too many of our loved ones are gone too soon and I've dedicated my life to spreading the awareness," he said. "I can't bring back Bryan but hopefully I can help save someone else's father, brother, mother or sister."

Maurice and Bryan, along with three others, became members of TLL on the same day in 2011. They shared many memories together and although not bound by blood, always called each other brothers.

Maurice and his brothers lead the Bryan T. Thomas Bone Marrow drives in Southern Maryland through TLL. Cancer.net states that thousands of people with life-threatening diseases of the bone marrow such as leukemia, aplastic anemia and various cancers, are in need of bone marrow transplantation. "We use every opportunity to spread the word," he added. "We especially target minorities groups such as African-Americans, who make up less than 8% of those registered.

Members of TLL supported the Be the Match registry at the NBC 4 Health & Fitness Expo held in Washington, DC on Jan 11th and 12, which was lead by Juliette Williams, an Account Executive with Be The Match, which is operated by the National Marrow Donor Program. She said the weekend goal was to register 100 new people and she was happy to report that the goal was surpassed.

"Most people think it's a painful thing but it's not," she said. "Registering is only completing a form and doing a cheek swab. The Be the Match team added that 75% of marrow transplants are done in a similar method as giving blood. Juliette also said the work couldn't be done without the help of groups like TLL. "It costs \$100 to process each registrant. We'd love more groups to volunteer both time and financial donations," she added.

Garrett James is the Health Initiatives Chairman for TLL and helped to organize volunteers for the event January event. He said that even though TLL's main focus was in Southern Maryland, it was an honor to share the message in DC. "When it comes to helping to save lives, we don't believe in jurisdiction. TLL organizes about four 4 blood drives with the American Red Cross each year in Southern Maryland and we're dedicated to matching that in Be The Match bone marrow registry drives." James said. Maurice added, "We encourage other organization and groups to organize their own Bryan T. Thomas Bone Marrow Drive. We'd love to collaborate and save lives together!"

The 2013 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) College Fair resulted in 693 on site college admissions and provided over \$1 million in awards for high school students, bringing the College Fair's 7 year total to 3,188 students admitted with awards just under \$4 million. This event is the Chapter's signature outreach community service activity that embodies our Cardinal Principles.

Over 40 HBCU recruiters were present with over 2,000 students from 54 area high schools registered who were eager to explore and discuss the college options provided by attending HBCU's. With more than 1700 applications filed by students, this Camden HBCU College Fair was the largest event of the Malcolm Bernard HBCU College Fairs. This event is annually held in the metro New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania Tri-State Area.

The Camden HBCU College Fair continues to grow in popularity and has become a very important collegiate event for many high schools. Its geographic footprint extends well beyond Camden County

and encompasses all of South Jersey, New York and into the Philadelphia suburbs. It has become the preeminent venue to introduce local students to HBCU's, and more importantly, the venue to provide them with opportunities to help realize their college dreams. The fair also garnered press coverage in area newspapers, as well as, TV news.

Xi Phi 2014 Black College Tour

New York, NY. February 2014. Xi Phi Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. embarked on their 25th Annual New York City Black College Tour (BCT). Through the tireless efforts of brothers in the chapter and from Corridor 5, BCT has been able to take high school students from the Greater New York City area on a tour along the eastern sea board to see the Historically Black Colleges and Universities. In the 3 years under the current leadership the program has evolved from a simple college tour to a College Readiness Program. The NYC Omega Black College Tour assists students in the process from HBCU acceptance to enrollment.

The Black College Tour is run by Chairman Brother Edward Murray, and Basileus of Xi Phi Chapter, Brother Mujaheed Bey. Additionally, the BCT committee is comprised of concerned community leaders from the New York City metropolitan area and members of our Sacred Fold. Brothers who served as chaperone include Brother Ramon Daley, Chaplain of Nu Omicron Chapter, Brother Alphonso Morrell, Basileus of Beta Alpha Alpha Chapter, Brother Shawn Brannon, Keeper of Peace of Psi Lambda Lambda Chapter, and Brother Malcolm King, Talent Hunt Chair of Psi Lambda Lambda Chapter.

Each of the brothers in addition to chaperoning spent extensive time with their assigned students to discuss students' career goals and academic competiveness in the outset of their collegiate lives. The Black College Tour in this way provided students with positive examples who may later serve as mentors for these youth. Brother Ed Murray continuously reinforced to students that "when a high school scholar joins the NYC Omega Black College Tour, they are family for life."

To this end the tour makes sure that students are prepared to embark on the Black College Tour. The tour offers pre and post tour workshops regarding SAT preparation, obtaining Financial Aid, the history of Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Etiquette, and College Life. The BCT is propelled by the idea that every student deserves an opportunity to succeed. Basileus Mujaheed Bey stated, "The tour has room for high achieving students and students needing to be redirected."

This year, 73 high school scholars attended the Black College Tour. Over the course of 7 days, 6 nights, 73 scholars and 15 chaperones visited Virginia State University; Fisk University; Meharry Medical College; Tennessee State University; Spelman College; Morehouse College; Clark Atlanta University; Benedict College; Allen University; Johnson C. Smith University; North Carolina A&T University; St. Augustine's University; Howard University; Morgan State University; and Coppin State University. Additionally the scholars had three field trips, The Great Black and Wax Museum, Benjamin Mays Museum, and Young Male Institute Cultural Center. Many of the students were able to receive on-site admission to universities due to their affiliation with the New York City Black College Tour. This year, a milestone of \$335,000 in scholarship money was awarded to BCT students along with over 50 college acceptances while on tour.

In addition the success of the tour has garnered media attention. Some of the media credits include; WXLTV 19 in Columbia, South Carolina; "Here and Now" WABC, WBLS/WLIB NYC; and Blog Radio.

A Social Action Project of this magnitude is quite costly. It cost on average \$880 per student to run the tour. The students are charged \$400 while Xi Phi Chapter through its 501c3 CUP Inc, sponsors \$480 for the first 40 students. The remaining expenses are met through our corporate and personal sponsorships.






